The Public Health in Ghana Program covers major public health issues in Ghana, and both Western and traditional health care systems.

The program combines classroom lectures and field practice with an in-depth application of quantitative and qualitative research methods for community health in Ghana. Students will learn about Ghana's historical, social, political, economic, and cultural environment, to provide a context for understanding the country's health care system, and health beliefs and practices.

Field trips, include visits to Elmina Castle, Cape Coast, Kakum National Forest, craft centers, schools, museums, and other cultural institutions. The Ghana program provides a unique opportunity to experience local African art, music, and rural living.

Public Health in Ghana is targeted to graduate public health students, and upper-level undergraduate students from ALL majors following a selective application process.

Students will spend the first week attending lectures in Accra and then move to the town of Larteh, Eastern Region for the community engagement experience. Evaluation of students' work will include journaling, individual reflections, participation in focus groups, and a final community and poster presentation.

Students who elect to participate in the Public Health in Ghana program should note: There is a three-week required online orientation class (non-credit bearing) to prepare students for fieldwork for the Ghana program during March/April of the previous semester. Students should plan their course schedules accordingly.
